I will also see a sign that has the zoo's guidelines on it for review.


I may see and hear other people. I may hear music from the shop or the pool next door.

It is important that I stay on the designated paths and stay off and behind fences.






Another area I can visit is known as the "North American Plains".

I may see kangaroos in the "Down Under" area.








The train, Wild Dog Stop, mine sluice, and carousel are available seasonally.

"Cat Canyon" and "Kansas Waters" habitats are nearby.



Cat Canyon is home to three different species of cat.

Bobcats, jaguars, and cougars live here.









The viewing area in Cat Canyon is covered and offers shaded areas.

I may notice that sounds echo in this area and may seem louder.

It is important that I do not tap or bang on the glass windows.



Between Cat Canyon and Kansas Waters is a swift fox habitat.

I may notice new smells when I walk by this habitat.

## Kansas Waters is home to North American River otters and has many interactive signs throughout this area.





The pathway is gravel and may feel different under my feet.

I may hear water splashing and smell new scents in this area.



I may see signs that tell me how to be safe when visiting or signs that give more information about the zoo or the animals.

I will be safe, and the animals will be safe, too.

Animal is under veterinary care.


